Six Essential Defining Characteristics of Essential Questions

As a result of comparing essential and nonessential questions and studying the additional examples, you should now have an idea of what makes a question "essential." Here are six defining characteristics. A good essential question

- 1. Is open-ended; that is, it typically will not have a single, final, and correct answer.
- 2. Is thought-provoking and intellectually engaging, often sparking discussion and debate.
- 3. Calls for higher-order thinking, such as analysis, inference, evaluation, prediction. It cannot be effectively answered by recall alone.
- 4. Raises additional questions and sparks further inquiry.
- 5. Requires support and justification, not just an answer.
- 6. Recurs over time; that is, the question can and should be revisited again and again.
